MINUTES OF SECOND ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING **HELD ON MONDAY, 6 SEPTEMBER 2004 IN THE CAROLINE HAND SUITE, LONDON ROAD STADIUM, PETERBOROUGH**

Chairman

Leigh Porter opened the meeting by informing members that the Board had decided to appoint Peter Lloyd as the Chairman of the Trust, while he (LP) would continue as Chief Executive of the Trust and Supporter-Director on the PUFC board. He then handed over to PL to take charge of the meeting.

Minutes of the Annual General Meeting of 8 September 2003

Taken as read as a true record of the meeting.

Chief Executive's Report

LP thanked all present for attending the meeting; it was vital that the Board kept communicating with the members. Although it was traditional at an AGM to review the previous year and outline the plans for the future, LP wanted to devote most of his report to the latter. Constant improvement was the key for any trust and it had to keep on its toes at all times for the development of both the Trust and the football club.

The Trust had made some significant achievements over the last twelve months, most noticeably gaining a place on the board of directors of Peterborough United FC. This had been an aim from Day One and it was wonderful to achieve something that many thought we might struggle to do.

As the last year had been very challenging for the Trust and everyone involved in it, LP acknowledged the efforts of the entire Board. It was particularly important to mention the Gold Bond Super Draw and especially the efforts of Walter Moore. Gold Bond was now the Trust's main source of income.

In referring to Barry Fry's deal to acquire the football club as "by no means straightforward", LP said that the Trust took its place on the board with a clear aim to raise money for the purchase of shares. In doing this, a large shareholding would place the Trust in a strong position when the majority of shares eventually became available. However, as his own B shares were unavailable, Barry Fry was in a position only to offer unissued shares in PUFC Limited at £2 each. Accordingly share purchase had become an impossible exercise for the Trust for the time being. Since it had formed a major part of the Trust's involvement with the club board, it was a priority for the Trust to look into different ways to become involved and bring value to the club.

In recent months the Trust had undertaken a lot of research into the community aspect of football. As there was no significant community scheme within PUFC, this was an area ripe for change. At other clubs community schemes had proved very successful, providing not only an extra revenue stream, but more importantly promoting links with the local community and encouraging contact with young people, the fans of the future. Some of the Trust Board had spent a great deal of time travelling round the country researching these schemes and the support available for them. He felt that the Trust and the club could work very closely together and hoped to have positive news to relay to the members soon.

The Trust and its Board needed to examine how it should change to reflect all these developments. As the coming year could be the most testing, the Trust needed to make sure that it was ready to react.

Finally he thanked the members for their valuable support.

Treasurer's Report

RB explained some of the background to the audited accounts, which had been circulated to the members attending the meeting.

In referring to LP's earlier comments regarding the value of shares, Paul Little asked why the audited balance sheet showed that the Trust's holding was worth £2,000. RB said that this had been the subject of much discussion with the auditor and for the time being it had been decided to show the shares at the purchase price.

Appointment of Auditor

The following notice had been issued to all members attending the meeting:

"The usual procedure at an Annual General Meeting is for the Board to "lay a revenue account and balance sheet duly audited and signed by the auditor and incorporating the report of the auditor thereon before each annual general meeting.

At the First Annual General Meeting on 8 September 2003 Mr Richard Taylor FCCA was re-appointed as the auditor. His fee of £200 had kindly been paid by Trust member Trevor Hanks. Earlier this summer Mr Taylor notified the Board that he intended to increase his fee to £700. As the Board considered that it could not justify such an outlay, it was decided (after obtaining advice from Supporters Direct and their solicitors) to seek the services of a new auditor urgently. Subsequently the Board, having secured the resignation of the existing auditor, Richard Taylor, was fortunate to receive an offer from Trust member Tony Millen, to audit the accounts at no cost to the Trust.

At a recent meeting the Board decided, pursuant to Rule 94, to move the following resolution at the Annual General Meeting:

That Anthony Millen be appointed as the auditor of the Society in place of the retiring auditor.

The Board thanks Tony for his generous offer to become the Trust's auditor and especially for undertaking the work free of charge."

The auditor, Tony Millen, was re-appointed by unanimous vote.

Secretary's Report

PW provided a factual report on what had happened since the last AGM.

Shares

At the time of the 2003 AGM the Trust had had 388 shares in PUFC. It now had 1,390, with another single share due to be transferred to the Trust by Waller, Needham & Green. Most of the additional shares had been acquired when the Trust organised a bucket collection for the refurbishment of the floodlights. Having handed over £2,000 to the club, the Trust received 1,000 shares in return.

Membership

Since inception of the Trust 520 adult members had joined, of whom 102 had done so in the last 12 months. Since the first renewals had become due in late December 2003 about 65% of members had renewed. Of these almost 20% had rejoined for five years, ten years or for life. As this renewal rate was above the average for other trusts, the Board thought that the excellent membership benefits negotiated by KJ were partially responsible. Since inception of the Trust 128 junior members had joined, of whom 35 had done so in the last 12 months.

Activities

In the last 12 months the Trust had organised the ball boys and girl at every home match, the New Year's Party, a balloon race and the Gold Bond Super Draw lottery. As for the Club Shop, the Trust Board had, while serving, restocking and stocktaking, put in 462 man-hours in 2003/04 and 134 man-hours in the current season. These almost 600 man-hours were probably worth about £4,000 and had brought in revenue totalling £45,000 last season and £16,000 in 2004/05. The Board members enjoyed doing this work, because it enabled them to meet members, take subscriptions, answer queries and sell its own goods – mugs, legend sets, programmes and books.

Contacts and learning

In the last year the Trust had joined the East Midland supporters' trusts and attended meetings, seminars and training days, making contacts, obtaining ideas, advice and knowledge on fund-raising, grants, community projects etc.

Communications

Ten newsletters had so far been issued, at an average of one every two months. They were costly and time-consuming, but vital in communicating news to the members. It was similarly essential to have a column in the matchday programme.

Rule changes

PW advised that there had been two changes to the Rules, which set out a timetable (that had not existed before) for the elections of Board directors and the supporter-director on the club's board.

Board changes

PW outlined changes to the Board since the 2003 AGM. In November 2003 Peter Lloyd had been co-opted. In May 2004 Rhys Thrower had resigned and finally Barry Bennett was due to leave the Board after the AGM, although he would still assist the Trust in a number of ways. PW thanked RT and BB for their help and

advice. He also extended the Board's thanks to Tony Millen, the new auditor, Walter Moore, the Gold Bond organiser, Mick Robinson for the quiz and Ray Watson and his colleagues for the use of the Caroline Hand Suite.

Election of Board members

Richard Bellamy, Keith Jennings and Gill Williams were re-elected unopposed.

Election of Supporter-Director on the board of Peterborough United FC

Leigh Porter was re-elected unopposed.

Any other business

Jon King asked whether the Board would consider a lower life membership subscription for persons over 60.

Question and Answer Session

Paul Little asked why, in the Brentford programme notes, there had no been no mention of the Trust's objective to seek control of PUFC on behalf of the fans. Did this signify a change of policy? PW responded by advising that there was no ulterior motive in the omission of that particular objective. The principal message of the item had been to emphasise the fact that [as stated in the Rules] the Trust's objects had always been promote PUFC as a community club and to represent the interests of the community in the running of the club.

Paul Little asked whether there existed an action plan to acquire the club. Peter Lloyd advised that it was not yet ready.

Paul Donnelly (PD) asked LP to elaborate on his comment that the next year could be "the most testing". LP reiterated that the situation had changed substantially since the Trust had been invited on to the club board and that the Trust had to adapt to changing circumstances.

PD enquired whether LP had asked the PUFC board how much it would want for the club. LP answered in the negative. PD then asked whether he had put the same question to PUHL regarding the ground. Again LP answered in the negative.

With reference to the rent payable to PUHL, Paul Little asked whether the lease required the tenant to pay back-rent. Peter Lloyd advised that the Trust had only seen an unexecuted copy of the lease and thus did not know whether it was the final version. However, he doubted that it contained such a clause. The lease was currently being studied by an expert and his comments were awaited.

Referring to the Trust's "war-chest", BB asked whether LP was under pressure to hand over money to the club. LP confirmed that the policy adopted since last year had not changed and that any significant decisions would be referred to the membership.

PD asked, on a scale of 1 to 10, what pressure LP was under to inject funds into the club. LP answered: Five. While other trusts bought club shares strategically, this was not the case at PUFC, since Barry Fry's own shares were not available for purchase.

Closing remarks

In closing the meeting, PL reiterated that the Board was determined to keep the Trust relevant and remained guided by its aims, which had not changed at all. He thanked all those members who had attended and reminded them that the Board welcomed any offers of help from the membership.

Quiz and raffle

Following the formal proceedings there was a quiz, set by member Mick Robinson, the winner being Jon King, who won a first-day cover of the Posh v Darlington Division 3 play-off final in 2000 and a Trust gift set. The free raffle was won by Dave Porter, who collected a bottle of whisky kindly donated by Keith Jennings.

The meeting closed at 9.30pm.

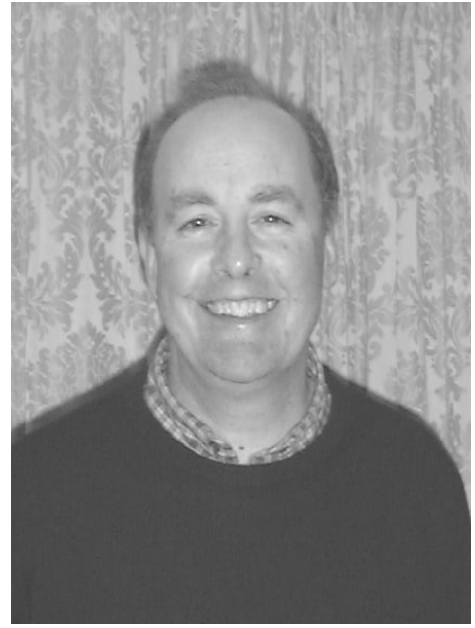

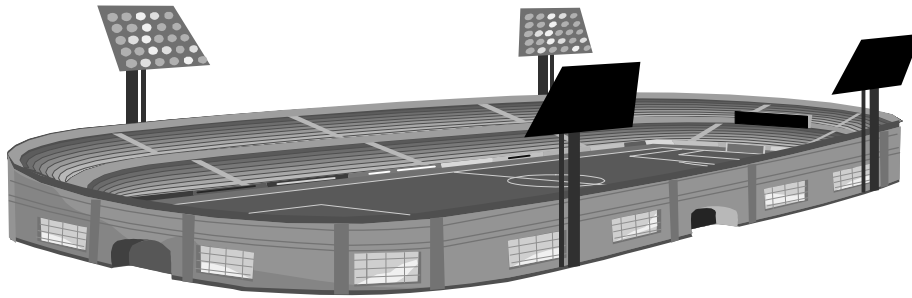
POSH PROGRAMMES

NEWS FROM THE TRUST WORLD



A recent **SUPPORTERS DIRECT** survey shows that supporters' trusts have raised £10.2m for the good of the game. Supporters Direct reports that there are now 117 registered trusts. Of these 57 have a shareholding in their club and 38 have board representation of some sort. Nine clubs are owned or controlled by their trusts: AFC Wimbledon, AFC Telford United, Brentford, Chesterfield, Clydebank, Enfield Town, Exeter City, Lincoln City and York City. The most recent trusts to register as Industrial and Provident Societies are Aylesbury United, Burnley, Chorley, Chesham United, Wycombe Wanderers and Merthyr Tydfil. The average subscription is £11.61, with £10 the most common amount charged. Montrose Trust charges £40, while Plymouth's Argyle Trust (which is not an IPS) has no fee, but asks for donations.

Trust in Luton (TiL), **LUTON TOWN'S** supporters' trust, has selected Kelvin Dunn as the supporter-director on the club board. The trust played a vital role in the survival of the Hatters after the club's financial troubles and twelve months in administration.

In August **CHESTERFIELD** Football Supporters' Society organised a hugely successful Gala Day at Saltergate. Around 2,000 people turned up to meet the players, watch a Spireites legends match, tour the ground and participate in a range of activities. As part of The Club's the Hub initiative, a number of organisations were represented, including Energy Conservation, the Police, Neighbourhood Watch and Chesterfield Canal Trust. The event raised £6,000 for the club and the trust.

HEART OF MIDLOTHIAN Supporters' Trust has launched a "Save our Hearts" campaign to stop the club's planned move from Tynecastle to Murrayfield, to raise funds to purchase a significant number of shares in the club and campaign for boardroom change. Meanwhile the club has agreed a £22m deal to sell Tynecastle. The club can withdraw from the deal before 31 January 2005 if an alternative site can be found.

THE MONEY GAME

The Deloitte Annual Review of Football Finance, published last month, contains some mind-boggling statistics. In 2002/03 total income for all 92 league clubs was £1,658m, 75% of which went to Premiership clubs. The average income of Premiership clubs was £62.3m, compared with £10.6m for clubs in Division 1 [now called the Championship] and £3.2m for clubs in Divisions 2 and 3 [now Leagues 1 and 2]. Even in the Premiership the gap between rich and “poor” was huge: Manchester United’s income was £174m, whilst West Brom’s was £18m!

In 2002/03 the 92 clubs paid transfer fees totalling £203m (compared with £407m in 2001/02). Out of this total £187m was paid by Premiership clubs, but only £32m of it went to Football League clubs (compared with an average of £50m a year since the birth of the Premiership in 1992/93).
